PRAYER (Chris Black, PNK)

Eternal God,

you do not need our praise.

The world itself tells of your glory:

sunrise and birdsong, and ruggedness of landscape,

the randomness of rain,

beauty for the eye, nourishment for the body, music for the soul—

these all speak of your goodness these honour your name.

You do not need our praise.

Other places can do it better with finer music or fewer words, with centuries of tradition or buildings of rare beauty.

Other people can do it better,

where two or three are gathered

who live in poverty or under threat,

and who, despite all that oppresses them,

rejoice to be called your own.

What can we add

by the way of magnificence or testimony

when these are more eloquent?

You do not need our praise, but we need to praise you.

It is the yearning, the restlessness

which you have planted in us.

It is our desire for a true home
and unconditional acceptance that brings us here.

All the rumours we have heard about you are true: you love, you forgive, you transform.

And you know us, oh, how you know us.

You perceive what in us needs to be loved, what in us needs to be forgiven, and what in us needs to be changed.

Lord, have mercy on us Christ, have mercy on us. Lord, have mercy on us.

These are the words of Jesus.

They are strong and true, so believe them:

We need no more words, just penitence.

'I have come that you may have life in all its fullness.'

'Go in peace; your sins are forgiven: Come, each one, and follow me.'

Now, God, help us to live as a forgiven people—visibly different, gloriously free, for Jesus' sake. **Amen.**

INTRODUCTION TO THE READING (John Urquhart, StM)

Before the events described in our reading, Peter and John have brought healing to a poor man, lame since birth, who sat begging outside the temple. Peter says to him, "I don't have any silver or gold! But I'll give you what I do have. In the name of Jesus the Messiah from Nazareth, get up and start walking."

Peter takes him by the hand and helps him up. The man's feet and ankles become strong, and he jumps up and starts walking, jumping and praising God. Peter uses the opportunity to speak to the astonished people in the temple precincts about Jesus, saying: "Faith in Jesus made this man completely well while everyone was watching." The authorities arrest Peter and John and the next day examine them at a meeting of the religious leaders of the nation.

In the reading we hear this 'good deed' referred to as 'a sign', effectively pointing to something outside itself-- to the presence and power of God through Jesus. Later in the reading, we'll hear those first followers of Jesus praying to God: "Stretch out your hand to bring healing and enable *signs and wonders* to be performed through the name of Jesus, your holy servant." Signs and wonders are both ways of referring to what we in the West have learned to call miracles, sometimes dismissively. A *sign* appeals to our understanding; a *wonder* evokes a more emotional response, appealing to our imagination and sense of worship. See if you can spot these words in our reading.

BIBLE READINGS Readers: Janis and David Hogg (StM)

Acts 4: 5-31 (Common English Bible)

Reader 1: The next day the leaders, elders, and legal experts gathered in Jerusalem, along with Annas the high priest, Caiaphas, John, Alexander, and others from the high priest's family. They had Peter and John brought before them and asked, "By what power or in what name did you do this?"

Reader 2: Then Peter, inspired by the Holy Spirit, answered, "Leaders of the people and elders, are we being examined today because something good was done for a sick person, a good deed that healed him? If so, then you and all the people of Israel need to know that this man stands healthy before you because of the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene—whom you crucified but whom God raised from the dead. This Jesus is the stone you builders rejected; he has become the cornerstone! Salvation can be found in no one else. Throughout the whole world, no other name has been given among humans through which we must be saved."

Reader 1: The council was caught by surprise by the confidence with which Peter and John spoke. After all, they understood that these apostles were uneducated and inexperienced. They also recognized that they had been followers of Jesus. However, since the healed man was standing with Peter and John before their own eyes, they had no rebuttal. After ordering them to wait outside, the council members began to confer with each other. "What should we do with these men? Everyone living in Jerusalem is aware of the sign performed through them. It's obvious to everyone and we can't deny it. To keep it from spreading further among the people, we need to warn them not to speak to anyone in this name." When they called Peter and John back, they demanded that they stop all speaking and teaching in the name of Jesus.

Reader 2: Peter and John responded, "It's up to you to determine whether it's right before God to obey you rather than God. As for us, we can't stop speaking about what we have seen and heard."

Reader 1: They threatened them further, then released them. Because of public support for Peter and John, they couldn't find a way to punish them. Everyone was praising God for what had happened, because the man who had experienced this sign of healing was over 40 years old.

Reader 2: After their release, Peter and John returned to the brothers and sisters and reported everything the chief priests and elders had said. They listened, then lifted their voices in unison to God, "Master, you are the one who created the heaven, the earth, the sea, and everything in them. You are the one who spoke by the Holy Spirit through our ancestor David, your servant:

Why did the Gentiles rage, and the peoples plot in vain? The kings of the earth took their stand and the rulers gathered together as one against the Lord and against his Christ. Indeed, both Herod and Pontius Pilate, with Gentiles and Israelites, did gather in this city against your holy servant Jesus, whom you anointed. They did what your power and plan had already determined would happen. Now, Lord, take note of their threats and enable your servants to speak your word with complete confidence. Stretch out your hand to bring healing and enable signs and wonders to be performed through the name of Jesus, your holy servant." After they prayed, the place where they were gathered was shaken. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began speaking God's word with confidence.
