PRAYERS OF THANKSGIVING AND INTERCESSION (Joan Cape PStM)

Gracious and ever loving God, we bring to you now our prayers for other people and for ourselves. We thank you that we can come to you in this way, in the knowledge that you listen to us and in your time respond to us. We are journeying through difficult days, and the certainty that you walk each step of the way with us brings us much reassurance – for this also we thank you.

We pray for those who are working day and night to help maintain the health of the nation: our doctors and nurses, in and out of hospitals, the ambulance drivers and paramedics, the healthcare workers, the pharmacists. We pray for the people carrying out tests, and for the scientists striving to develop better ways of dealing with this virus. We pray for our school and nursery teachers, along with those engaged in child care – all of whose contributions are essential to enabling those key workers to carry out their responsibilities. Sustain each one, according to their need.

Lord in your mercy: hear our prayer.

We pray for those who are lonely and frightened, told to stay at home yet yearning for just a few minutes' company, or for the comfort of a gentle touch. We ask that you will be for them a very real presence. And we pray for those who are reaching out to such as those: the many volunteers undertaking shopping, the collection and delivery of prescriptions, the dog walking – bless them and keep them safe as they serve their neighbours in these ways. Along with them we ask your blessing on the vast army of people dealing with all aspects of maintaining the supply of food and necessary goods: the lorry drivers, the people working in our shops, and the people dealing with the click and collect points and the home deliveries. We ask that you would keep them safe, and that they would know the value of what they do.

Lord in your mercy: hear our prayer.

We pray for those struggling to work from home, often with inadequate equipment, poor heating, and in need of a word of support from a colleague. Those problems are much the same for those dealing with home schooling – parents and children alike – and compounded for the many whose home has to serve as work place, schoolroom and nursery at one and the same time. And we pray too for those who have no work, no money, little hope – but still have to try to live from day to day. The stresses and strains are enormous – Lord, we pray protection on all whose lives have been turned upside down by the events of the past year.

Lord in your mercy: hear our prayer.

Lord God, we bring you these prayers not just for ourselves but for the whole world, for we know that this pandemic does not respect any boundaries. We think of countries where there is little basic infrastructure to support an event such as this, where levels of poverty and human need are so great that even small disruptions can elevate things frighteningly quickly to crisis level. And so we lift up to you all those in government – asking that party politics, factions, pride, and the desire for personal glory be set aside, and that all would work together for the good not just of their own country but of mankind. And we cannot omit to mention the United States of America: Father, we ask that common sense would prevail and that a spirit of unity would fall upon that land.

Lord in your mercy: hear our prayer

As we bring these prayers to you, we ask you to remind us always that none of us can be a disinterested bystander as the events of life unfold. We all have our part to play, through what we do, and say, and think. Gracious and ever loving God, as we offer our lives to you, we ask that you will help us always to be open to your Spirit in our thoughts, feelings, and actions.

And these things we pray in the name of your son, our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.
