WHAT DO YOU KNOW ABOUT SAFEGUARDING?

The Church of Scotland Safeguarding Service provides support to congregations. You can find all the information you're likely to need on the Church of Scotland website.

The Safeguarding Service assesses all applications for working, or volunteering, in church. This is part of a clearly laid-down recruitment process, in which applicants must provide references and be interviewed by the appropriate people.

Safeguarding training is provided for everyone who needs it by Presbytery-appointed, volunteer trainers. Our Presbytery Trainer is Sheila Anderson.

Each congregation has at least one Safeguarding Coordinator. Their role is to help ensure that all instructions about safeguarding are carried out. In St Mungo's, our Safeguarding Coordinator is Jim Paterson. Jim is supported by a Safeguarding Panel who are Neil Cape, Christine Jackson and Margaret Webster.

It isn't up to the Safeguarding Coordinator or the Safeguarding Panel to investigate allegations of abuse or harm. Instead, they're to gather basic information, principally who, what, where and when. Then, it's the role of the police or social work to investigate if there's any evidence to support this or not.

Safeguarding is always an item on the agenda of all Kirk Session and Presbytery meetings. Joan Cape is the Safeguarding Contact at Presbytery.

Safeguarding is not just about child protection; it's about ensuring all members of the church and the community are safe from all forms of harm: physical, emotional, psychological, sexual, financial and spiritual.

Spiritual abuse can be committed by people in positions of power in any religion or denomination -- and also by others, such as family and friends, who use religious texts, beliefs and practices to exert control over others.

Statistics help to show where abuse can happen. For example, 1 in 3 women will experience domestic abuse or sexual violence in their lifetime. In 2018, the Domestic Abuse (Scotland) Act criminalised 'controlling and coercive behaviour'.

Here's another example: in 2020, 76% of children aged 9 and 10 in Scotland had a mobile phone. The fastest growing type of child abuse in the UK is 'self-generated child sexual abuse', where a child is led to livestream themselves carrying out sexual acts.

Later in the service, we will pray for all involved in safeguarding and protecting people from harm and for those who have been hurt or harmed by others.

BIBLE READINGS Reader: Fiona Hutcheson

Genesis 1: 26-31 (CEB)

Then God said, "Let us make humanity in our image to resemble us so that they may take charge of the fish of the sea, the birds in the sky, the livestock, all the earth, and all the crawling things on earth."

God created humanity in God's own image, in the divine image God created them, male and female God created them.
